

CONNECT with Pastor Goff

FUN. FELLOWSHIP. FOOD. FORWARD.

Those four words summarize the congregational meeting on April 28.

FUN. As one of our "Jubilee" celebrations in observation of our 70th anniversary, our time together began with a fun activity. Teams were established (a gold team and a blue team) for a game of "St. Michael Hears a Who" (modeled after the Dr. Seuss book, "Horton Hears a Who.") ESM Principal, Dr. Ben Stellwagen, served as our game show host asking the teams a series of questions related to the Bible, the Catechism, the history and life of St. Michael, and of course Dr. Seuss trivia. The scores were close, but the "Blue" team won.

FELLOWSHIP. Psalm 133:1 best characterizes the overall feeling of the whole event – "How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity." The table conversations, the interactions with one another in the food line, the cordial spirit expressed during the meeting all reflected "God's people living together in unity."

FOOD. How could you go wrong with pulled pork and chicken, coleslaw, baked beans and ice cream! While it wasn't your typical potluck, the food itself (i.e., pulled pork parfaits) added to the fun of the event.

FORWARD. The word "forward" probably best characterizes the outcome of the congregational meeting. The voters moved forward with the following:

- 1. The proposed Bylaw revision (governance model) passed with 92% approval. The next step in the process will be for members of the current church council, together with the newly elected church council, and members of the Governance Task Force to prepare a Policy Manual which will outline the structure for how our Church Council will operate. Our governance consultant, Jim Galvin, will be on site with us the weekend of May 31-June 2 as we begin to write that policy manual.
- 2. With the approval of the new governance model, a slate of candidates was elected to serve as the new Church Council beginning July 1. The newly elected Church Council will be: Tim Thoms, President; Luke Thompson, Secretary; and Melyssa Lennington, Treasurer. Additionally, there are five "At Large" members on the Council: DeeDee Beights, Corrie Cable, Matt Hendrickson, Elizabeth Ruch, and Dan Smith.
- 3. The role of congregational elders will change somewhat under the new Bylaws. The congregation approved the following slate of Elders: Jeremy Allyn, Bob Boyd, Adam Hahn, Paul Leininger, Steve Manges, Ryan Meyer, Mark Muntzinger, Nathan Nix, Craig Patterson, and Paul Selking.
- 4. In my report, I shared information on the work of our Facility Review Task Force which has been meeting since the beginning of the year. The focus of the Task Force has been to pick back up the work of a previous building committee in 2019 whose work had since been put on hold due to COVID and the senior pastor vacancy. At the meeting Sunday we heard from our principal, Dr. Ben Stellwagen, a number of facility needs to enhance our school's ministry. Additionally, Dr. Stellwagen shared that due to the financial blessings of our school this past year, several months ago the ESM school board awarded both congregations (St. Michael and Emmanuel) \$250,000 as a matching challenge for future building needs. More recently, the ESM school board has awarded both congregations \$80,000 for more immediate building needs. With the gift of the \$80,000, the congregation approved allocating up to \$20,000 of that to begin work on conceptual building designs and gathering additional information in order to prepare further building recommendations to the congregation at the November Voter's Meeting.

Reflecting on this most recent congregational meeting, I give thanks to God for the blessings of St. Michael and for the opportunities we have to carry out our mission of, "Connecting People to Jesus and Others."

ST. MICHAEL CHURCH STAFFING

You are already aware that Tammy Bruns, Executive Director for St. Michael, began a new position with Brotherhood Mutual beginning mid-April. We are thankful for Tammy's nearly 15 years of dedication and commitment to St. Michael in her role on our church staff.

In Tammy's absence, we have made arrangements for Tammy's duties and responsibilities to be covered in the interim. Assisting us with administrative and financial functions is Jenny Reith who is the Parish Administrator at St. Peter's Lutheran Church (serving in a similar position at St. Peters to what Tammy had here at St. Michael) and Rhonda Scott, who is the Director of Finance at St. Peters. Pastor Goff knows both Jenny and Rhonda personally and has worked with them in other projects while he was working at The Lutheran Foundation. Jenny and Rhonda bring years of church administrative and financial leadership that will be helpful in not only filling some current gaps on our staff, but will also help evaluate what kind of position(s) will be necessary here as we move forward.

In addition to Jenny and Rhonda's assistance, newly elected St. Michael Church Treasurer, Melyssa Lennington, has agreed to assist also with financial matters for St. Michael. Melyssa's accounting background as well as a former business owner, will provide additional insights for us during this interim as well. While Melyssa's term as Treasurer of the congregation on the Church Council officially beings July 1, her early involvement not only provides some needed assistance, but also provides her a first-hand financial look as our incoming Treasurer. Over the next several weeks, we will evaluate our long-term needs and then make recommendations for moving forward.

We also want to thank Jen Clendenen for serving in the position of Family Ministry Coordinator for the past year. In that role, Jen has recruited and supported our Sunday School staff, and helped to plan various family activities such as our Fall Festival and Palm Sunday/Easter Egg-stravaganza, etc. Jen will be taking on some additional responsibilities in the school (ESM) next year and feels that she needs to step away from what she has been doing as our Family Ministry Coordinator. Our church staff and congregation leaders will re-evaluate the ongoing needs for this position in the coming months. THANK YOU Jen for your energy and for your sacrificial dedication to family ministry this past year.

THE BRIDGE MINISTRY

Have you ever worked with a matrix to gauge progress on a particular task? Last fall, I had the blessing of sitting down with Matt Peeples of the Kairos Network and talk about the Bridge Ministry. One of the pieces that he helped work through was setting goals and giving measures to how we know we met a goal as we look at the Bridge ministry. The matrix creates a way of looking at how all those goals help us achieve the ultimate goal of connecting people to Jesus by growing young adult leaders to lead small groups throughout our community.

One of the pieces to my matrix: I send texts asking for prayer requests to 20-25 people per week. Out of those texts:

- Usually at least five people have specific prayer requests.
- Prayer requests usually lead to 2-3 face to face connections each week.
- Those requests grow into deep conversations.

It is amazing to see how God can work through a simple text message. I invite you to join me in texting 2-3 people in your life and see what conversations come out of them! Simply say: Good morning, you are in my thoughts and prayers today. Is there anything specific I can be lifting up for you today?



As we continue our year of remembering and celebrating we take a look at the 2nd decade of St. Michael from 1964 - 1973. The decade began with Reverend Bernard Hemmeter continuing as St. Michael's first pastor. He retired in 1968 and St. Michael welcomed it's second pastor, Rev. Donald E. Meyers. This was a tough decade in the history of our church. The A-frame was finished in May 1958 and the church membership had grown to nearly 350. Unfortunately, the building of the A-frame left a large debt which led the church to sell a portion of the property in order to relieve some of the weight. As some of our original members wrote, "we didn't really want such a fancy church-but the powers assured us that the area was destined for rapid growth and we would soon have new members to help support St. Michael. They were right when they said the area would grow. Only their prediction was 20 years late in coming."

In addition, in 1967 the first church building, the Pioneer Building, which was still being used for Sunday School rooms, youth group gatherings, etc. caught fire which led to it being dismantled.

During this decade the larger Lutheran Church Missouri Synod was experiencing some conflict largely centered around the means of how to interpret scripture. In this time of conflict, a group of pastors, seminary professors, and seminary students began a movement away from the conservative LCMS practices. Many churches were affected by this rift and St. Michael was one of them. Pastor Meyers recommended we leave the Missouri Synod and become affiliated with the newly forming Lutheran Church of America. It wasn't long until lines had been drawn-those agreeing with the move and those saying they wanted to remain with the Missouri Synod. The official vote was close but St. Michael remained with the Missouri Synod. Half of the congregation left with Pastor Meyers to form St. Andrew Lutheran Church which was located on Homestead Rd. They later joined forces with Lord of Life and became known as Risen Savior Lutheran Church. The congregation of St. Michael was left with no pastor, the church building, an enormous debt, and painful memories. As Pastor Shawn mentioned in a recent sermon, this was a season of drama and trauma. Thankfully, as a member of the LCMS the pulpit was filled with ministers from the Seminary. And healing was able to begin.

A bright spot in all of this was Emmanuel - St. Michael School (ESM). It began just before this decade in 1962. The school continued to grow as they built or remodeled the school property at Emmanuel to develop a new gym/auditorium, a meeting room with kitchenette, a stage, showers and three classrooms. Ted and Donna Braun continued to serve the school as teachers and school cook and Chuck and Mary Daenzer were both called to teach in 1965. Chuck Daenzer later became principal where he served until his retirement. Mary Daenzer served as a Kindergarten teacher until her retirement. She also led the Adult Choir and both she and Chuck led the youth for many years. What a blessing they and many others were.

Although this is a tough decade to remember, we are living proof that God walks with His people through all things. We continue to gather and serve today with the blessings of an amazing community and a strong school. All praise to our Lord God Almighty!

WHAT DOES THE CHURCH DO WITH THE CONNECT CARDS?

GIVING OUR TIME AND TALENT with Bruce Schroeder

Back in February when Pastor Goff asked me to build a cross for Good Friday I thought, "sure they're pretty easy". I've created many crosses in the past so immediately my mind went to designing and construction materials. Then Pastor said he wanted it to be old and rugged, possibly a railroad tie. He wanted the congregation to nail their sins to it on Good Friday.

"OK" I said with some hesitation, and the next morning my coworker, Fred & I carried in two railroad ties that had been lying alongside the shop for about thirty years. I wanted the wood to dry out before cutting into it. I was amazed at how well they had held up over the many years. But it was the weight that was overwhelming.

As I began the machining process, I couldn't stop thinking about the actual cross my Lord and Savior had hung upon. After cutting the cross beam and notching it to fit into the vertical post, I again was surprised at its exceptional weight. It was only 54" long! Probably shorter than the one Christ carried yet it weighed close to a hundred lbs.! Could His have been this heavy? What an unbelievable burden to carry, especially after being beaten nearly to death. The vertical beam was only one hundred inches long and perhaps weighed one hundred and fifty lbs. yet probably four feet shorter than what the Romans used.

Pastor had told me that the cross would need about five hundred holes so we could simply place our nail into a predrilled hole instead of everyone hammering their nail in. I decided to get three additional nails to represent the ones that went through Christ's hands and feet. I thought "how long of a nail does it take to pierce two feet and hold securely in the wood of the cross?" I imagined the pain of those nails ripping through His flesh. How it would hinder or possibly stop him from being able to lift himself enough to take the slightest of breaths.

Then I started to drill the holes. One for my sins... Just one? Five hundred would not be enough for my sins. I kept drilling. Holes enough for everyone's sins? Five hundred and three holes I drilled yet I could not comprehend the number of sins heaped upon Him. My sins, your sins, the sins of everyone in the congregation, the sins of all believers, the sins of all those who don't believe and even the sins of all people from the beginning of time until the end of the age. Who could possibly bear such pain? Who could endure the weight of all mankind's sins? No wonder He was sweating blood just thinking about it.

When Good Friday came, I nailed my sin to the cross along with everyone else. Then I sat there watching as person after person added their sins to the cross. An elderly woman ever so gently placed her nail into a hole and a little child found a hole near the bottom for their sins. It brought me to tears and back to the drilling of hole after hole after hole with each one representing an unknown amount of our sins all taken willingly, purposely upon Himself to save us.

What kind of God sacrifices Himself for the sake of His subjects? No, not subjects, His creation! His dearly, loved creation. Our God does! The God of love! What great love He has shown to us in His own crucifixion. What great love He shows to us, each and every time He grants us forgiveness. For forgiveness, except for death, is possibly the greatest expression of love there is.

ST. MICHAEL FOUNDATION

Last weekend, the 18th annual St. Michael Lutheran Church Foundation awarded \$18,850 to the gospel ministries affecting St. Michael. This is our largest amount awarded in our history. You may remember that the St. Michael Lutheran Church Foundation Board after thoughtful and prayerful consideration last fall transferred St. Michael's Foundation assets to The Lutheran Foundation of Fort Wayne. In 2006 our original funds of \$31,225 were deposited into the Lutheran Community Foundation in Minneapolis, MN. At that time the local, Lutheran Foundation, was in their early days and did not manage congregation endowments. Our Minneapolis group transitioned to the InFaith Foundation and recently to Thrivent Charitable Impact & Investing. We thank them for their wise investments for St. Michael these past 17 years. The St. Michael Foundation Board was interested in the lower fees that our local foundation offers along with its local and strong faith leadership component. All current account names and holdings remain the same. A unanimous vote transferred funds from Minneapolis to Fort Wayne on September 20, 2023.

Awards this year were based on our deposited fund value on February 29, 2024. Our total investment is \$460,301. Funds are deposited in The Lutheran Foundation, Fort Wayne, IN. Only a portion of the endowment is spent with the principle growing and providing a permanent source of income to support St. Michael ministries. This year 4.25% of qualified funds was awarded based on member requests.
